

### A year of growth & change

Dear CWIT supporter,

In fiscal year 2019, we continued to provide critical reentry services to women, while experiencing positive growth and change. The Center for Women in Transition provided 146 women with a supportive environment in which to transform their lives. I hope you read the report to find out more about their many successes!

This past year our organization grew in significant ways. We added 6 key positions and restructured several others, which has allowed the Center to expand the services offered to women leaving prison and jail. This past year, the Center:

- Created two Behavioral Health positions to provide on- and off-site trauma-informed counseling as part of our continued efforts to provide trauma-informed services, thanks to a generous grant from the Missouri Foundation for Health.
- Expanded its community-based services to reach more women who want or need to live in independent housing.
- Grew its pre-release services. The Center now has staff devoted to meeting with women prerelease to begin assessments and case planning as a means of promoting a smoother transition to the community.
- Added a certified peer support specialist who provides group and individual support for women in recovery from substance use!

The Center celebrated two important anniversaries this year: Barbara Baker, Advocacy Director, celebrated her 20th year as an employee, and House Monitor Supervisor, Barbara Hoskins, celebrated her 10th work anniversary. Both of these employees have helped change the lives of so many women reentering the St. Louis community from incarceration, and continue to do so daily. Just this year, Barbara Baker received her Peer Specialist Certification to further empower clients. Supporters like you allow employees like Barbara Baker and Barbara Hoskins to continue their inspiring efforts to provide women with opportunities for lasting change.

Thank you for supporting our goal of advocating for and assisting women in the criminal justice system! The growth we experienced is only possible because of our dedicated community of supporters. With your support, we will continue to see women successfully transition to their families and communities.




The Center offers comprehensive, wrap around services to women leaving incarceration, including:

- Safe transitional housing and rent support
- Basic needs, including food, clothing, toiletries, rent assistance, health care, and transportation costs
- Case management
- Vocational support
- Life skills education
- Behavioral health services, including trauma counseling
- Mentor partnerships
- Court advocacy
- Peer support for those in recovery from substance use disorders

"One day, I had a stroke. It messed me up very bad. I was kind of isolated. I had dope, cigarettes, weed, and all that. But then, there was this one day I said no, I don't want it anymore. I'm so happy that God put me at CWIT. I want to get a house, a job, a Master's degree. I want to save my money, and keep saying no to drugs." - Robin

80% of clients have mental health challenges


