

From the Executive Director

Greetings,

Thank you for making last year yet another remarkable year for the Center for Women in Transition! As we embarked on our 20th year, our **dedicated staff, committed board and mentors, generous donors, and invested community partners** helped us to make the year one of expanding outreach while strengthening programs and services.

Amid the **national opioid crisis**, the breadth of **mass incarceration**, and a shifting political climate, the Center continued its critical services of assisting women transitioning from the criminal justice system, **providing stability** and helping them to **develop plans for the future**. The Center has also continued to work toward becoming a trauma informed organization, so that we can better respond to the effects of traumatic experiences on the lives of our program participants, staff, and others.

Once again, we helped make **positive change in the lives of the 158 women** we served last year. I hope you will read ahead to learn about their stories and achievements. We are grateful for the community partnerships we expanded this year: As part of enhancing the Center's trauma responsiveness, we partnered with Mercy Professional Services to **provide 6 clients with 39 hours of free on-site counseling.** We also launched services as a collaborative partner in the MacArthur Safety and Justice Challenge grant awarded to St. Louis County, allowing **19 women** to enter the Mentoring and Advocacy program from St. Louis County Jail, providing them the opportunity to **enroll in drug treatment, obtain employment, and be paired with a community mentor.**

Our ongoing goal is to **reduce recidivism** in the St. Louis region while providing opportunities for lasting change in our clients, and **you truly make this possible!** The Center is stronger than ever due to our expanding community of supporters who comes together to donate time, resources, and talent in support of our important mission.

Rosalind came to the Center with next to nothing. A series of criminal charges made it hard for her to get a job, because, as she describes, "people did not want to trust that change is possible." Less than a year later, she now has an

apartment, a car, a job that she loves, and the support of people who believe in her.

After 3 months in her current job, Rosalind is eligible for a promotion. She hopes to go back to school to study psychology, so she can use her experiences to help other people.

What is diversion?

Diversion (n.):

1. An instance of turning something aside from its course.

2. An alternative to incarceration; the act of diverting people involved in the criminal justice system from jail and prison.

The Benefits

Diversion allows a person to remain connected to her community and family, while addressing the

underlying issues that led to unlawful activity, decreasing the likelihood of recidivism. In the community, she may receive substance abuse treatment, find employment, pursue education, and more. Diversion is a cost-effective alternative to incarceration; not only does it save taxpayer dollars by avoiding the high costs of incarceration, diversion allows justice-involved individuals to contribute to their communities' economies.




